NEW EXPRESSIONS!

Have been training Present Perfect Continuous

A verb tense used to describe an action or event that started in the past but continues until now. It's made by using the verb "have" in the simple present tense, followed by the past participle form of "be" (been) and a verb in the present continuous tense.

She's been living here since 2015. They've been fighting over the cat. I haven't been sleeping well. He has been working non-stop.

Have you been talking to your relatives?.

Hold up a minute

An idiomatic expression that means "wait", "delay", "stop and listen". It can have the same meaning of "hang on a minute".

Hold up a minute, I want to get a coffee to go. Hold up a minute! Why didn't anyone tell me about this?

I'm ordering Be + verb+ing

The present continuous tense structure is used sometimes to indicate

the future. It can be differentiated from the present tense by context. It's usually used to talk about plans that have been made, although that is not a rule set in stone.

I can't go out tonight, I'm writing a new chapter of my book.

She's getting Chinese for dinner.
