NEW EXPRESSION

Past Participle Broken

The past participle of the verb "break". For regular verbs, the past participle is formed by adding "ED" to the end. Irregular verbs don't follow a rule, so their forms must be memorized. Verbs can be used as an adjective in this form. Here, it describes the state of the sink.

Her arm was broken in two places. We are joined today by a new family. Are you ready to be challenged? They had swollen eyes.

Frowning

It refers to the action of forming an expression of disapproval or displeasure. It's more likely linked to turning the corners of one's mouth down, and pinching the eyebrows. It can also be a noun or adjective, depending on its use.

You're going to get wrinkles if you keep frowning. Turn that frown upside down!

Call it quits.

A phrase that means to give up or abandon something; agree to stop working on a specific task.

It's impossible to fix this bike, I'm calling it quits. They called it quits after raising \$18k for charity.



Cutting corners

It means to do something in the easiest, cheapest, fastest, or most convenient way.

I never cut corners when it comes to my health.

The company was accused of cutting corners when it came to safety.

Call it a day

An expression often used when we refer to ending an activity or a period of time in that activity. It means to stop what you are doing because you do not want to do any more or think you have done enough.

I'm exhausted, I'm calling it a day.
