NEW EXPRESSIONS!

Had better

An expression that has no perfect translation to Portuguese. We use "had better" to refer to the present or the future, to talk about actions we think people should do or which are desirable in a specific situation. The verb form is always had, not have. We normally shorten it to "'d better" in informal situations. Synonym to "would be wise", "would be sensible".

We'd better get going before it rains.

He'd better discuss it with someone else.

Phrasal verb

Meet up

A phrasal verb is an expression, usually formed by a verb and a preposition. They tend to not have a perfect literal translation, and are better understood through context. They change the primary meaning of a verb, and that's why a perfect translation can't be found. There are countless phrasal verbs in the English language. Here you can see some examples, with differing meanings. Some phrasal verbs can be separated, and some are inseparable.

Let's meet up after lunch.

Stand by to be seen by a doctor.

You can come over whenever you want.

I figured out the equation.



Thanks for helping me out today.

She works out in the mornings.

They broke up because they were too different.

We need to get you to a doctor, you are burning up.

Shut the computer down and let's go.

Please fill out this form.

Cool beans

An informal exclamation, used mostly in the United States, used to express approval or delight.

Everything was approved? Cool beans! Let's meet up later? Cool beans!
