# NEW EXPRESSIONS!

## Come to an end

An expression that means something has reached an end, the conclusion of something.

The work at the bay has **come to an end**.

This dispute needs to **come to an end**.

## Hell of a

An informal expression that is used to make a forceful statement. It can mean very good, very bad, or difficult.

She was one **hell of a** painter.

We've been having a **hell of a** time trying to figure out a schedule.



## **Tell me about it**

A phrase that can be used as an ironic acknowledgment of one's familiarity with a difficult or unpleasant situation or experience described by someone else. It's also used to say that you feel the same way or have had the same experience.

“He’s driving me crazy.” “**Tell me about it.**”

“Something is wrong around here.” “**Tell me about it**”.

## **Leave it to chance**

It means to not plan or prepare for something. To leave whatever situation in the hands of fate, instead of actively working on something. To resign oneself to something's outcome being determined forces outside of one's control.

That is not the best thing to **leave to chance.**

She never plans for anything, she **leaves** everything **to chance.**



## Fall into place

If things fall into place, events happen in a way that is satisfactory for you, without problems. It can also mean that events or details you didn't understand before become easily understandable.

When you plan things well, everything **falls into place**.

Once I discovered that the woman was his sister, everything **fell into place**.

## Approach

A noun, meaning a way of dealing with something, a way of doing or thinking about something, the act of moving or becoming near or nearer to someone or something, the act of approaching, an act or occurrence in which something comes nearer.

Try to **approach** the situation with a different view.

That is a great **approach** to live by.
